A Word on Wednesday from Pastor Tonia "Hallmark Theology" 10/25/23

No test or temptation which comes your way is beyond the course of what others have had to face. All you need to remember is God will never let you down; He will never let you be pushed past your limit;

He will always be there to help you come through it. (I Cor 10:13)

It's that time of the year. We have watched pumpkins frost over, trees put on a final show as their leaves turned yellow and red and shone in the sun, before they fell.
