A Word on Wednesday from Pastor Tonia "Do You Know Who I Am?" 9/27/23

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. And the Word became flesh and dwelt among us, and we have seen His glory, glory as of the only Son from the Father, full of grace and truth. (John 1:1; 14)

And God became a human, exchanging His royal robe for dusty sandals and a common tunic. Instead of being surrounded with worshipping angels, He came to work as a carpenter, to hang out with fishermen, to serve others. We always think we're so special, and hopefully to someone we are, but really? We like to say everyone is equal, so why do some people think they are more equal than others?

We are in a time, not unlike other times in history, but this is the time in which we live. We are coming out of a pandemic. Things have been turned upside down. The wait time is longer, the line is longer, and yet our patience is not longer. Businesses are dealing with supply chain issues, lack of employees, lack of applicants. We place blame and think "if only," but no matter how much better we could run the world, things aren't moving at the speed we think they should.

We want to snap at the clerk and say, "Do you know who I am?" There's the rub, who am I?
